ALL SAINTS' PAROCHIAL CHURCH COUNCIL REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

Aims and Purposes

The Parochial Church Council (referred to as 'the PCC' or as 'the Council' of All Saints' Church, Gosforth, in the diocese of Newcastle) has the responsibility of co-operating with the incumbent ('the Vicar') in promoting the whole mission of the church in the ecclesiastical parish.

The PCC has maintenance responsibilities for the Church and the Church Centre, both of which are in West Avenue Gosforth, and also for two properties adjacent to the Centre. The Church Office is located within the Church Centre.

Objectives and Activities

The objectives of the PCC are defined by the Parochial Church Council (Powers) Measure 1956 as 'to co-operate with the minister in promoting in the parish the whole mission of the Church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical'.

The All Saints' mission statement is:

Working together as a church we are pursuing a vision to put All Saints at the heart of the wider community. Our vision is to be a vibrant, inclusive, compassionate, outward looking church with a sensitive and thoughtful approach to faith, where there is excellent pastoral care with encouragement for all, where diversity is welcomed and our worship inspires us to transform the world.

The main activities of the All Saints' PCC are:-

- co-operation with the incumbent in promoting in the parish the whole mission of the church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and commercial.
- the provision of regular public worship that is open to all.
- the provision of sacred space for personal prayer and contemplation.
- the provision of pastoral work including the visiting of the sick, the elderly and the bereaved.
- the teaching of the Christian faith through sermons, home groups, youth and children's meetings and links with local schools.
- the promotion of the Christian faith through various events for the elderly, parents, children, young people and other special needs groups organised by the clergy and PCC and through the distribution of the parish newsletter and magazine.
- making known and putting into effect any provision made by the Diocesan Synod or the Deanery Synod, but without prejudice to the powers of the PCC on any particular matter.
- giving advice to the Diocesan Synod and the Deanery Synod on any matter referred to the
- raising such matters as the Council consider appropriate with the Diocesan Synod or Deanery Synod
- repairing and maintaining all church buildings, and raising the money for this purpose.
- providing proper insurance for all aspects of the parish life.
- responsibilities under the Health and Safety Act, Data Protection Act, the Food Act, Copyright Act and Child Protection Act.

Membership

Members of the PCC are ex officio, co-opted, or elected at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) or at the first meeting of the PCC in accordance with the Church Representation Rules. During the year, the following served as members of the Council:

Ms Kath Davies was co-opted at the first meeting of the PCC following the 2022 APCM and continued to serve as the Safeguarding Officer. Mr Fred Carr was co-opted at the same PCC meeting, and continued to serve as PCC Treasurer. Dr Alison Charlewood was co-opted at the same PCC meeting to serve as PCC Secretary.

Structure, Governance and Management

The Parochial Church Council (PCC) is a corporate body established by the Church of England. The PCC operates under the Parochial Church Council Powers Measure. Following changes in the relevant legislation it has registered as a charitable body with the Charity Commission. The appointment of PCC members is governed by and set out in the Church Representation Rules.

The PCC has nominated officers responsible for Health and Safety (including disability discrimination issues) and Safeguarding (of children and vulnerable adults) who receive training and information from the diocese and cascade this to the wider PCC as appropriate. These issues are standing items on the agenda for meetings of the PCC.

The Standing Committee, comprising the Vicar, the Churchwardens, Lay Vice-Chair, Treasurer, Secretary and two members of the PCC, has the power to transact the business of the Council between its meetings. The Standing Committee deals with detailed operational issues concerning the deployment of resources (buildings, money and staff) within the overall strategic framework determined by the PCC, and reports to each Council meeting. A sub-group of the Standing Committee, the Fabric Committee, deals with more detailed fabric issues. Working Groups of the PCC meet regularly and conduct business on behalf of the PCC. One or more of these groups provides feedback at each PCC Meeting. These groups act as official sub-groups of the PCC covering between them all areas of church life and mission: Pastoral, Education and Discipleship, Outreach and Communication, Mission and Justice, Social and Events. The groups meet approximately four to six times a year and report regularly to the PCC.

Other subcommittees include the Youth Committee, which is responsible for the work with children and young people and the Safeguarding Group, which is responsible for child protection, the care of vulnerable adults and related issues. Other time-limited sub-groups may be formed and then disbanded once their remit has been fulfilled, according to the direction of the PCC. Numerous other groups and committees operate within the auspices of the church. Whilst not formal sub-committees of the PCC, they play a valuable part in church life and their activities are explained in more detail later in the document which accompanies this report.

The major risks to which the PCC is exposed are identified and managed through the appropriate officer or sub-group (e.g. through insurances or Health and Safety assessments). One-off issues are risk-assessed as required by the PCC.

Vicar's report

There were many tests and obstacles to overcome throughout 2020/21, but much was (and continues to be) learned from this challenging time.

In 2022, my role and responsibilities to animate the life of All Saints continued as we moved out of the pandemic and looked ahead, discerning a way forward. In September 2021, I introduced a Renewal and Funding Group to help us think through, together with the PCC, how we might engage and welcome afresh the wider community. I am heartened to say that throughout 2022, numerous group discussions and actions enabled many new initiatives to be promoted and trialled. (I mention more of these in the calendar.)

I hope my Annual Report 2022 illustrates that despite uncertainty and far fewer volunteers, we endeavoured to ensure that our worshipping life and pastoral work continued (especially to the older members of our community) and that, with tenacity, we have continued to develop both our Mission and Ministry in new ways.

St Hugh's, throughout 2022, has faced its own range of challenges and I am only too aware of my responsibilities to those parishioners. Whilst not being referred to here, I shall speak about these at the Annual Meeting.

The Year

A team of churchwardens, volunteers and paid employees worked hard to sustain our life as a Community of Faith which included the routine schedule of services on Sundays and Festivals, work to welcome and accommodate groups in the Centre, also to maintain the buildings and fabric and do the essential administrative tasks.

Services

There was a total of 5 Weddings; 1 Thanksgiving for a child; 17 Baptisms; 1 Blessing of a Marriage; 23 Funerals (11 in church); and 9 Services for the Burial of Ashes.

School Assemblies were led by clergy at the Archbishop Runcie First School (at least once a week), Archibald First School, and in Regent Farm School in the St Hugh's parish. I am a Foundation Governor at Archbishop Runcie Church of England School as are three others from All Saints.

The church was used additionally throughout the year for School Services and/or curriculum visits by Gosforth Junior Academy, Westfield School for Girls; Archibald First School; Archbishop Runcie First School and also Newcastle School for Boys (both Juniors & Seniors).

Care homes were regularly visited in the parishes of St Hugh's and All Saints and services led in Eothen, Moorfield, and Kenton Hall.

Calendar 2022

January

- The Volunteer Project leaflet promotion continued (it was launched on Advent Sunday 2021) having been disrupted by bad weather
- Meetings via Zoom began for many committees including the Parochial Church Council
- A Hub Church concept (All Saints with St Hugh's, Ascension, & St Mary's) was revisited and questioned. (It would be revised later in 2022.)
- The Archbishop Runcie First School Admissions Policy proposed change was debated (the Parochial Church Council accepted residence in either parish of All Saints /St Nicholas and active members of another Christian Church within the parish as a qualification for admission)
- Rehearsals for the Good Friday performance of the musical 'Jesus Christ Superstar' began
- The Church Centre activities including 'Coffee & Conversation' also 'Choir at the Centre' reconvened, attracting members beyond our community.
- We were loaned a grand piano (installed in church) heralding the first of monthly concerts until December (organised by Rosamund Place with Master Musicians International). One of the most moving performances of the year was to be that of Khrystyna Mykhailichenko from the Ukraine who played works by Beethoven, Chopin, Brahms and Liszt.
- Research began as to the possibility of Farmers' Markets on the Green.

February

- On the first Friday of every month, from 10:00 11:30, a dedicated gardening group began work on the Garden of Remembrance and its surroundings
- At the 9:30 service on Sunday 6 February , we welcomed Gosforth Air Cadets to celebrate 81yrs since their foundation.

March

- The Northumberland Wildlife Trust staff and volunteers worked to improve the health of our West Ave hedge and make it a more welcoming haven for wildlife (part of the Urban Rewilding Project)
- An Appeal was launched resulting in an overwhelming response for items to assist refugees arriving in the North East from Eastern Europe and Ukraine.
- A Café Church took place in the Centre and was led by the Young people's group 'Evolution' recounting what they had learned during lockdown.
- A Lent study began. This was a 5-week programme on 'Superstar', (afternoons in the Centre or evenings via Zoom) - an exploration and reflection of issues raised by the production.
- During Lent, on Sunday evenings in church, members of the congregation were invited to reflect on their understanding of the Gospel.
- On Saturday 19 March, in the afternoon, a 'Cake and Nursery Rhymes' event for parents and under 5s took place in the Centre with 12 children attending. Parents enjoyed refreshments and children took away laminated Nursery Rhyme flip books made in-house (enabled and organised by Louise Waugh, Dorothy Henderson, Diana Lavin, Felicity Shoesmith and Katie Hogg).
- At 7:30, a Quiz Night organised by 'Tyneside Welcomes' in conjunction with All Saints raised a considerable sum and pleasingly attracted a number of new volunteers for the project.

 Before the month end, The Calvary Cross Faculty arrived and a crowdfunding Appeal was launched via a company, 'Spacehive', (with advice from Felicity Shoesmith) to help cover the cost of CCTV & security lighting alongside our insurance claim (pursued by Peter Brown).

April

- A fallen chunk of stone was discovered from an East window mullion and on the advice of the Church Architect, urgent work was advised. Subsequently, 2 panels of stained glass were removed, a new mullion was inserted and the very dirty East window stained glass was cleaned.
- On Palm Sunday afternoon an informal communion service in the Centre was held to welcome people who had not felt able to attend church since prior to Covid. Nearly 40 people attended followed by refreshments and music was provided by the Semitones Orchestra.
- On Good Friday we welcomed Rev Christopher Wardale to lead our 3 hours of devotion. That morning, there was also a children's event on the Green
- On Good Friday evening, a Concert Performance of 'Jesus Christ Superstar' took place in church, (led by John Lewis).
- Easter Day, following the 9:30 service, families gathered on the Green for an hour of Easter crafts and activities, the children making Easter bonnets/hats and hunting for chocolate eggs whilst parents enjoyed the sunshine.
- On Saturday 23 April we hosted an event to celebrate International Organ Day.
- The 2022 Annual Meeting took place on Sunday 24 April in the Centre. Paul Wilkinson also completed his service as Church Warden.

May

- During Christian Aid Week, 15- 21 May (organised by Lesley Atkinson) it was not possible
 to do house-to-house collections so envelopes were left in church and an e-envelope was
 put in place for online donations.
- Saturday 14 May: a new event 'Games on the Green' followed by pizza & ice cream took
 place and was attended by 24 children plus 20 adults (organised by Diana Lavin, Felicity
 Shoesmith and Katie Hogg)
- An application for a licence from Newcastle City Council to hold 6 Farmers' Markets (up to 12 stalls) on the Church Green to start in September was approved (*Diana Lavin on behalf of the Parochial Church Council*).

June

- A 'Jubilee Picnic', was held on Saturday, 4 June. Brilliant sunshine helped set the mood on the Green whilst attendees enjoyed a quiz, walking-corgi balloon races (fun for both adults & children) and celebratory cake (*Judy Riseborough*) with cups of tea whilst being entertained with music and song by Richard Hazelwood on his guitar.
- Sunday 26 June, the Rev Helen Lunn was licensed to the parish by the Bishop of Berwick, (her intended focus to be the Church of the Ascension).

July

- On Saturday 9 July, another new event, 'Teddy Bears' Picnic' was held on the Green.
 Children delighted in entering their teddy bears to abseil from the church tower, each complete with safety harness and all were awarded with a certificate all landing safely!
- On Sunday 17 July, we welcomed to the Green a folk band 'Timbre' who sang an eclectic range of European songs, mostly from Scandinavia.
- The Parochial Church Council meeting welcomed a visit by Archdeacon Rachel Wood and Chris Elder to 'explore' a formal framework for All Saints to be a hub church.

August

- The popular 'Open Gardens' event returned on Sunday afternoons.
- Monday 15 August heralded the start of the well overdue facelift to the Centre hall, kitchen, toilets, staircase and Columba room. The electricity sockets in the Centre and the west end of church were upgraded.
- On 19 August, we welcomed the Jigsaw Choir to sing from Shrewsbury.

- On Tuesday 23 August, the 'Handlebards' very popular return to the Green with their production of Shakespeare's Twelfth Night was well-attended by residents from all over the local community (organised by Ros Place).
- At the end of the month we said goodbye to Rev Beverley Davies. At her leaving event in October we reflected on how Beverley always related her faith in a down-to-earth way, using life experiences to reinforce her message. We also remembered how she patiently assembled the weekly YouTube services during lockdown. We wished her well in her new position at Benfield School.

September

- We cautiously reintroduced wine at Holy Communion. Members of the congregation were given the option of accepting one or both elements.
- On Saturday 15 September, our first ever Farmers' Market was held on the Green, in
 glorious sunshine with just 9 stalls present including pies, honey, bread, specialist cakes
 and our own charity stall of recycled kitchen/table equipment. Our appeal for donations for
 the East Window (rather than an entry fee) achieved a considerable sum (organised by
 Diana Lavin and Marian Cave).
- On Sunday 18 September, we welcomed Rev. Dr Miriam Jones, a Deacon who had been serving in the Diocese. She moved into St Hugh's Vicarage.
- On the same day, we held a special Commemoration Service for Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. We opened church and invited visitors to sign a book of condolence
- Our bells were rung in honour of the Queen's funeral on Monday 19 September.
- The following week, on Sunday the 25 September, at the 9:30 service, Felicity Shoesmith spoke about our work with Young People, highlighting the pressing need of how to welcome and engage potential younger members from our area.

October

- On Sunday 2 October at 9:30 we held our Harvest Festival with all our Uniformed Groups invited. Donations went to the 'Walking with Project' at Wallsend. At 3pm, in the Centre there was a Thanksgiving Service for those whom attending church is a challenge. This was followed with tea and music from the Semitones Orchestra
- The Calvary Cross was finally reinstated in the Garden of Remembrance on a stone plinth with uplighters and CCTV in place
- On Saturday 29 October, there was an afternoon celebration tea (pizza and cake) cup
 presentation and party games in the Centre for the Uniformed Groups and their families
 who had taken part in the Enterprise Challenge. (They had each been given £50 to see
 how they could make it grow.) In the evening, there was a sell-out Parish Quiz and
 delicious supper
- The average Sunday attendance count for the year 2022 was noted to be 134 (112 in October 2021).

November

- The Clergy from All Saints led the Remembrance Day Service in Gosforth Park. It was attended by many hundreds of local people.
- On Saturday 19 November, we held the annual (indoor) Church Christmas Fair (organised by Valerie Farthing & Francine Bain) and the second (outdoor) Farmers' Market. The events were financially successful and despite the cold wet day, the locals flocked to enjoy both.
- On Sunday 20 November, we were delighted to welcome Bishop Mark Bryant to church to confirm 5 candidates from All Saints and also St George's, Jesmond and The Ascension, Kenton. Those Confirmed from All Saints were Helen Christian; Roo Davies; David Kelechi Chibyeze-anoma; Garwain Hedley and Pamela Hedley, who was also baptised that evening.
- Paul Cross retired as a dedicated Bell Tower Captain after 12 years! We welcomed Yvonne Cairns to take on the responsibility for the day-to-day running of the tower.

December

- On Saturday 10 December the first Christmas Tree Festival event took place from 10– 12:30. Schools and all Groups with regular links with All Saints were invited to donate an upcycled/recyclable tree to help decorate our windows.
- We welcomed our new Youth Worker Jaddai Kambeya following 2 previous attempts to appoint a Youth Worker. After discussions with the Youth Committee and careful negotiating, we entered into a partnership with North East Youth For Christ. Jaddai will work with us one day weekly during term time and on occasional Sundays.
- The very cold weather leading up to Christmas had a detrimental effect on our Parish Carol Singing
- On Sunday 18 December, the Christingle Service clashed with the Football World Cup Final
- On Christmas Eve, a new, afternoon intergenerational event was trialled; it was planned particularly aimed at those families having young children (organisation by Ros Place).
 This was followed by the 2 traditional Carol services at 4:30 and 6pm and a midnight Eucharist.
- A total of 934 people attended worship on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day.

Acknowledgements

Much could be said of *Ruth Birnie's* steady and faithful service. Ruth continues to be committed to her ministry among us. We are grateful also to *Vic Spong* for his contributions to our life. *Christine Willoughby* and *Nick Glover* have given most generously of their time as Churchwardens. (Nick had previously served on the PCC for over 6 years being Secretary for much of that time.) At the Annual Meeting in 2022, we gave thanks to *Paul Wilkinson* for his four years of devoted service (including his extra year to see us through the Covid changes) so freely given. We are very glad to have *Miriam* working among us. Her ministry is already bearing fruit especially in thinking how we reach young families.

Louise Waugh has overseen much of our operations with patience and flair. We are grateful that she has so many skills, is conscientious and always carefully manages conflicting demands. *Tricia Maylia* has again taken great care of both the church and Centre and helped to oversee many funerals and weddings in church.

Fred Carr has continued to dutifully and carefully oversee our finances. There is much work he does that often goes unnoticed and we remain indebted to him for his hard work. We appreciate too our dedicated Gift Aid Recorder, *Margaret Patterson* and our Fees Treasurer, *Chris Bolland*,, whose roles are quietly but most ably undertaken.

Peter Brown, acting in his role as vice-chair of the PCC has generously given time to attend to all church fabric matters and was very busy whilst overseeing the vital restoration of the Calvary Cross and repair of the east window. We are grateful to *Alison Charlewood* for taking on the (often onerous) role of PCC Secretary and her requisite set of administrative skills.

The Church Choir continues to progress in leaps and bounds under the directorship of *John Lewis* - his Superstar production, only possible after a tremendous amount of work, had the audience truly mesmerised. Continuing the musical theme, there are our bell ringers, in whose vital role we delight. Paul Cross was Tower Captain until November, retiring after 12 years inspiring and sharing his skills with his ringers. We are indebted to Paul and welcome *Yvonne* into the role

Thanks to Lesley Atkinson for running Young Saints and Little Saints and to Diana Lavin for leading the Tuesday 'Choir at the Centre' and her pioneering Farmers' Markets. Also to Katie Hogg who became a Foundation School Governor at Archbishop Runcie School and to both Marian Coulson Cave and Craig Dallison who stepped down from being Governors during the year.

Rosamund Place who has overseen our You Tube broadcasts and recordings, those that work on the Sunday coffee rota and the amnesty group.

Much appreciation is directed to the work Mother's Union, the Monday Club, Gosforth 'Tyneside Welcomes' (*Andrew Cole*), the 'Keeping in Touch' magazine editing team, the Christian Meditation Group, Sew Knit and Natter, and the Amnesty Group; those who cut the grass (*Keith Davies*) and tidy the church grounds; the readers, the intercessors, the Stewards and indeed, all those who enable our worship to continue each Sunday and many more whose work is done quietly and in the background.

Obituaries

Dorothy Henderson

Dorothy's sudden death was an awful shock. She possessed a "can do" attitude accompanied by much energy and commitment; the more challenging something seemed, the more she seemed to want to do it. Dorothy was a valued and loved member of our choir, was involved with our Sew, Knit and Natter group where she was treasurer, and she arranged and promoted our hugely successful Christmas Fair last year. Dorothy was our branch leader of the Mothers' Union and diocesan treasurer. She was an integral part of all the new children's events. She served on the Tyneside Welcomes committee and had offered a home for refugees from Ukraine. Sadly she died suddenly before the work was complete.

Alfhild Wellborne

Alfhild, who died in July is also a terrible loss. Alfhild, as well as being a caring mother and grandmother, had worked at The Seaman's Mission Church, at Archibald First School and she also took on a role at the City Centre Chaplaincy. She had been a Branch Leader for All Saints Mothers' Union and also co-ordinated the 'World Day of Prayer' for several years. Her life had been full and her faith was at the very centre of everything she did. We miss her strong presence among us.

Hilary Hide

Hilary was a very good friend to many of us and her loss is keenly felt. Hilary demonstrated her flair for many things in a range of ways, to many people. She was a core member of the Sew Knit and Natter Group, an expert gardener and excellent cook. Sympathetic and observant, she was a superb counsellor. She remained positive and brave in the face of loss and illness and had enabled David, throughout changing times, to have a most effective ministry as diocesan secretary for 22 years. Her thoughtfulness and wisdom will long be remembered.

And Finally

We have a vision that by 2026, we shall be a diverse community of all ages, of more than 300 active members, who, inspired by their encounter with God, are making a real difference in our context. We wish for our worship to be thoughtful, rich, the distinctive musical, liturgical and theological inheritance of All Saints reinterpreted to engage the present. We seek to be open and receptive to those who feel particularly on the edge.

We did so well in 2022 to maintain momentum and try out new ventures. This was a great achievement. I believe that ultimately our vision will be brought into reality by us living out the Christian hope entrusted to us in simple and sincere ways, and above all, by us embodying God's reconciling presence to each other and to others. I am always comforted by the fact that we are not called by God to be successful but fruitful. I believe being fruitful involves us going deeper in our prayers and being sensitive to others. I believe that the growth and development we seek will come from our journey inward both individually and as a community. I hope that in 2023 we will take more time to ponder the deeper things and so shine brightly to draw many afresh to the fire of God's love.

Congregation and PCC Meeting Details

There were 219 members on the Electoral Roll on 31 December 2022 (220 on 31 December 2021)

The PCC met 6 times in 2022. The average attendance was 82% (78% in 2020) The PCC regularly receives reports from the its working groups and the Fabric committee, in particular, has provided a great deal of valuable and relevant material. Regular reports have also been received from the Deanery Synod. There were also 2 Open PCC meetings on Sunday mornings after the 9.30 service.

Finance

All Saints' finances have slowly recovered from the Coronavirus pandemic which had a significant negative in 2020, and to a lesser effect, in 2021.

The accounts show a surplus of £101,602 for 2022 before taking account of the deficit of £6,911 in the market value of our investments. The accounts at the end of 2021 showed a deficit of £1,700 before an investment gain of £7,244.

Income

Total income, excluding legacies and grants decreased from £219,915 in 2021 to £215,472 in 2022.

Planned Giving

There were 134 members in our Planned Giving scheme at 31 December 2022 compared with 137 at the end of 2021, the reduction caused by deaths and parishioners who have relocated for family or employment reasons having exceeded new members joining during 2022. Planned Giving decreased by £6,163 (£106,524 in 2021, £100,361 in 2022).

Donations

Donations in 2022 totalled £31,493 which included £13,900 donated for particular purposes, the remaining £17,593 being from general ad hoc donations.

Tax Recovery

For 2022 we have claimed the maximum GASDS allowance of £8,000 giving an income of £2,000. GASDS and the gift aid recovered on Planned Giving and donations increased from £28,462 in 2021 to £30,830 in 2022.

Crowdfunding Appeal (using Spacehive)

In order to provide funds for projects involving the Calvary Cross Security and draining of the grass area adjacent to the Church, it was decided to seek matching funding from Crowdfunding North of Tyne set up by the North of Tyne Mayor. The result of the Crowdfunding appeal was as follows:

Grants

In addition to the two grants identified in the preceding section, Crowdfunding Appeal, a Parish Support Grant was received from the Newcastle Diocese Board of Finance for £1,000.

Expenditure

98% of expenditure is on activities related to the work of the church. The Parish Share and clergy costs support the ministry at All Saints and elsewhere in the diocese. Church costs provide for worship at ordinary and special services. Expenditure on the All Saints' Centre assists the mission of the church in the community at large.

Expenses for the year totalled £257,256 compared with £240,135 in 2021.

Properties

In order to comply with the Financial Reporting Standard FRS 102 and the Charities Act 2011, the houses were re-valued at the date of transition to FRS 102 of 1 January 2015 with assigned values as follows:

- Old Clergy House £210,000
- Verger's House £225,000

The properties have now been re-valued at 31 December 2022 as follows:

- Old Clergy House £250,000
- Verger's House £250,000

The two properties now have identical valuations as it has been established that they are similar with respect to floor area and number of rooms.

Rents

The All Saints' Centre continued to be used by a variety of different organisations and private parties. Rents received totalled £14,647 (£18,223 in 2021).

The Old Clergy House was occupied throughout the year. £7,925 was received in rent against expenses of £3,085.

The Verger's House was occupied throughout the year. £9,405 was received in rent against expenses of £1,415.

Mission Giving

The PCC continued to support the work of the worldwide church by dedicating open plate cash collections at services to our Mission of the Month.

Donations to the Mission of the Month charities are underwritten by the PCC to guarantee that each charity receives a sum equal to 3% of All Saints' previous year's planned giving and associated gift aid.

Donations paid to charities totalled £9,241 (£12,639 in 2021) of which £45 was contributed from church funds to comply with the underwriting guarantee. £4,514 of this amount was collected at funerals and other events using the church and sent to their nominated charities.

McMahon Permanent Endowment Fund

Income from this fund was £567 which, together with the £593 held over from 2021, was used to pay £900 for the repair of the Reredos in the Church leaving £260 to be carried over into 2023.

The Youth Project

The Youth Worker project income was £12,609 and the expenditure was £1,564 giving a surplus for the year of £11,045.

Legacies

Credit has been taken in the accounts for the amount of £132,500 from the legacy of Florence Muriel Atkinson.

Expenditure from the Legacies Fund in 2022 was £34,362 for the cost of the repair of the east wall of the Church, the provision of an electricity ring main in the west end of the Church, the decoration of the church centre, some of the costs of the Calvary Cross restoration, the church centre roof repairs and the provision of equipment storage sheds and fencing in the church centre.

Bank Balances and Reserves

Bank balances and cash at 31 December 2022 totalled £190,418 compared with £104,700 at the end of 2021. £119,818 is in the Legacies fund, £62,201 is held in the Gloria Smith fund that finances the Youth Worker project and £12,679 is held in other funds for particular purposes. The resulting cash deficit of £4,280 (reduced from a surplus of £27,007 in 2021) of the General Income fund, together with the £18,210 due from debtors, is used to meet the amount of £8,180 due to the creditors and to provide working capital.

The Legacy fund has increased from £57,327 in 2021 to £153,187 in 2022

Going Forward

The receipt of the £132,500 from the legacy of Mrs Atkinson has improved our overall financial position significantly. From this legacy there is a residue of funds so we may receive another £1,000 or so during 2023. We have also been notified of another legacy from the will of Mr Michael Ramsey Scott which should provide a sum of over £15,000 during 2023.

However, there are significant future costs already known about which have to be taken into account. The Church organ requires remedial works, the cost of which is estimated at £107,000. Also, the Parish Share has increased by about 5% to £117,000 per annum and will increase by another 5% during 2024.

The General Income fund is of considerable concern as it's liquid reserves is a negative of £4,282 before taking into account the £18,210 due from debtors and the £8,180 due to the creditors. From January 2023, all of the Planned Giving and associated gift aid is to be allocated against the General Income fund instead of a portion being allocated to the Gloria Smith fund. This should cause a very gradual transfer from the totally overfunded Gloria Smith fund to the General Income fund by about £12,000 per year. However, the effect on the General Income fund will be reduced by about £5,500 due to the increase in the Parish Share.

The reduction in Planned Giving continues which is a major factor in the low level of the General Income fund. Planned Giving has been the backbone of All Saints' income for many years and its reduction has to be at least halted and if possible reversed.

The future will be challenging, in particular to ensure that the General Income fund has sufficient liquid reserves for day-to-day expenditure.

Notes to the summarised accounts

1. Properties

The properties comprise the All Saints' Centre (previously called the Church Hall), which has been written off in previous years, and the two adjacent houses, the Verger's House and the Old Clergy House. The Verger's House and the Old Clergy House are both valued at £250,000, an increase of approximately 11.5% compared with the valuation at 1 January 2015.

The title to the land on which the All Saints' Centre and the two houses are situated is vested in the Church Commissioners.

2. Staff numbers and costs

The PCC has employed a part-time administrator and a part-time caretaker throughout 2022.

Their salary costs, including employer's NI and pension costs, together with organist's fees totalled £30,290 (£26,192 in 2020).

3. Related party transactions

The Revd Canon Andrew Shipton and the Revd Miriam Jones have occupied houses attached to their appointments. Costs borne by the PCC in connection with their houses totalled £5,617. Expenses payable to the Revd Canon Andrew Shipton, the Revd Miriam Jones and the Revd Beverley Davies amounted to £1,332. No allowances for expenses incurred in the course of work for the church were paid to any other member of the PCC in 2022.

These summarised accounts comprise information extracted from the annual accounts which have been examined by an independent firm of accountants qualified for this purpose. They are a summary of those accounts and may not contain sufficient information for a full understanding of the financial affairs of the PCC. For further information the full accounts, the Independent Examiner's report on those accounts and the PCC's annual report should be consulted. Copies of these, which were approved on 9 April 2023, are available on request from the Parish Office. The Independent Examiner's report on the full accounts was unqualified. - 3.4 Comments and questions arising from the Annual Report (pp1-12) No comments raised.
- 3.5 Financial Report and Presentation of the Financial Account for the year ended 31 December 2021.

Fred Carr, the All Saints' treasurer advised that, during 2021, church finances had recovered to a large extent from the affects of the Coronavirus lockdowns. Overall, there had been a surplus of just over £5.5k comprising a deficit of £1.7k in the P&L account and a surplus of about £7.2k surplus in the Investments. The surplus was mainly in the Gloria Smith fund (just over £7.5k), which finances the youth and children's activities, and in the general fund which had a surplus of £3.8k. The restricted funds for specific purposes had a deficit of just over £3.2k.

There was a reduction in planned giving members from 141 to 137 but planned giving income held up well being reduced by little more than about £2.4k to about £106.5k.

Gift Aid increased by about £1.4k partly due to the increase in GASDS (Gift Aid Small Donations Scheme) caused by the recovery in charity and general donations. GASDS increased from £715 to £976.

Grants were obtained by Peter Brown of £7,526 and £2,194 from Newcastle Council to compensate for the lack of business in the Church Centre.

Mission Giving recovered in 2021 with increased donations of just over £12.5k going to Charities of the Month and just over £5.2k going to charities nominated at funerals and other events in Church. Because of the reduced donations for charities about £1.0k was contributed by the General fund to maintain the underwriting of the Mission of the Month as 5% of our planned giving and associated gift aid.

Acceptance of the accounts was proposed by Lesley Ogilvie, seconded by Margaret Wilkinson and agreed nem con.

3.5.1 Questions and comments on the Accounts

Vic Spong asked about the figure of approximately £104k in bank accounts and cash. Fred related this to future fears over what inflation may do. He also referred to uncertainty over the valuations of the two Church houses, which may well vary. He also commented that the investments are doing well though not necessarily keeping up with inflation.

Margaret Wilkinson asked about the figure for Parish share. It was confirmed that this figure does not cover any payments for St Hughs.

3.5.2 Appointment of the Independent Examiner

Fred stated that the problems that he had with Haines Watts 2-3 year ago were now over and that All Saints now had a very cordial relationship with them. The reappointment of Haines Watts was proposed by Margaret Patterson and seconded by Edith Davison and agreed nem con.

Grateful thanks were expressed to Fred Carr for all the hard work he has put into the accounts throughout the year.

3.9 Vicar's Report

I am a great believer in All Saints. I believe in our theology and approach which is thoughtful, caring, and prepared to struggle with issues and avoids the danger of looking inwards. I hope it is experienced as decent, kind, honourable, ready to listen and not dogmatic.

I hope our approach illustrates that we value different voices and contributions.

I refer to page two of our 2022 Annual Report with sets out our mission statement and our vision for the future. It is always important to be clear about our values, ethos, and principles I have written in detail about 2021- it was quite a journey. The losses of David Hide, Bill Shaw, Dee and Chris Matthews, Constance and others are keenly felt. We miss many from our community who have not returned. It was good to see many with us at the Palm Sunday afternoon service.

It has been an extraordinary time. Christine Willoughby has only known being a church warden during covid whilst Beverley has experienced a different kind of curacy to the one envisaged in 2019! There is much to look back on and be thankful for.

As we look forward I have found Felicity Shoesmith's concept of identifying 3 groups for whom All Saints is significant as very helpful. There are who Worship regularly or watch on live stream, the Community and the Neighbourhood. A priority is to encourage these people to move into the worshipping life of the church – to the Lord in fellowship, to encounter him in word and sacrament.

Pastoral care is quite an issue. There were 23 funerals in 2021. The number receiving communion at home is now 8. 35 attended our service on Palm Sunday. Lots of new people are making contact. Covid has stirred up many to be in touch.

It is challenging and complex situation – we have less people to do things whilst more people do come and have a look at us to see if they might join us!

At St Hugh's many want to use the building, for example there is a new beaver pack from this Thursday but few attend on a Sunday.

We are coming out of the pandemic slimmed down, and simplified. We recognise the world is different with less routine, less of a sense of duty, many feel there are more options. We need to emerge stronger and in a good position to grow.

Diversity is welcomed and complementary gifts - we need to make more sense of people's current experience

The Renewal and Funding group are looking ahead with a series of events and projects including a farmers market and a new website. We need to appoint a youth worker, and there are the improvements to the Green.

Thank you to Ruth for her endless commitment, our thanks too to Vic, Beverley, Louise and Trisha. Thank you to Paul who has served as churchwarden for 4 years and brought much

attention to detail, plus energy and practical skills. Also enthusiasm to see projects through, with the fabric a speciality. He has overseen 4 Christmases and 4 Easters. He is well organised and well prepared; he has put up lights on the tower, and help repair the roof of St Hugh's. He has organised electricians and written countess letters to Centre users and neighbours as well as putting forward imaginative ideas. We are very grateful to him.

4. Comments and Questions from Parishioners

Margaret Wilkinson asked about progress on the appointment of a Youth Worker. Andrew replied that it was proving difficult to attract suitable candidates but it is ongoing.

Thanks were expressed to all who participate on the weekly Parish Breakfast rota. It was reported that the Crowd Funding campaign, to enable the restoration of the Calvary Cross and other works, has made a slow start and that there is a need for many small donations to help trigger the matched funding proposals.

However it is hoped that the restoration will be completed by September.

Thanks were expressed to Andrew for all the hard work that he has put in over the year, carrying the Church through the unprecedented events of recent months. Warmly agreed by the meeting.

Andrew closed the meeting with the Blessing.

Safeguarding Committee

The committee, which is a sub-committee of the PCC, has met 6 times during the past year. We have all been pleased to be able to meet now in person rather than on Zoom.

As well as the ongoing business of ensuring that everyone who has a position of responsibility or who works with children and vulnerable adults has an up to date DBS certificate, the committee has received reports from the Safeguarding Officer, Kath Davies, on the progress being made on the Diocesan Dashboard. Thanks to Kath's untiring efforts, All Saints has reached the highest level of compliance and is currently at Level 3.

In September we welcomed Rev Dr Miriam Jones to the committee. Miriam brings a fresh eye to our discussions, and, as a mother of young children, keeps us up to date with youth culture!

In January Jaddai joined us to report on his work with families and young people. As well as trying to get the new Royalz group (formerly Evolution) off the ground, he is spending time in several local schools, sharing the Gospel with the young people and helping them to think about their spiritual journey through life

Dr Alison Charlewood is now the Domestic Abuse Champion for All Saints'. She is available for anyone who is concerned about this to chat confidentially for advice on where to get help. Recently a training session on Domestic Abuse Awareness took place for members of the PCC and Safeguarding Committee.

This group has been very conscientious over the year and thanks go to all the members for their commitment to ensuring that ours is a safe, caring church.

Tower Report

In June we celebrated the Queen's Diamond Jubilee and rang for that, a very jolly occasion. Things took a sudden downward turn however when she passed away at the beginning of September, and our ringing then was much more sombre – half-muffled and fully-muffled bells to mark her death and for her funeral, but then more joyous again to celebrate the accession of King Charles III. We will of course ring again for his coronation in May.

Our band has remained pretty steady and we are lucky to have 8 to 10 ringers most Sunday mornings (perhaps fewer in the evenings but normally at least 6). Fabric Committee

This has been a busy year for the Fabric Committee with several major projects coming to fruition, as well as a backlog of maintenance work to address post-covid.

The Church

East Window Repair

After a fallen piece of masonry was discovered from a mullion in the East window a major project was undertaken to repair the window including: removal of adjacent glass, stone repairs to the surrounding mullion and other areas identified as at risk, replacement of glass and cleaning of the entire window internally. We are delighted to see it shining out to the people of Gosforth once again as it would have done 100 years ago!

Installation of power supplies

It was identified that the lack of power to the West end of the church was becoming a problem which would curtail plans for social events, online giving and hosting of events on the Green. Two new ring mains were installed so that we now have power in the North and South aisles and in the South porch adjacent to external doors.

Repair of Chancel Screen

We were delighted to meet specialist joiner Ray Harrison who was able to reinstate the damaged areas of the screen, including carving missing pieces to match.

Ringing chamber heaters

Obsolete heaters were replaced just in time for the first cold snap of the winter.

The Centre

Completed Works

Redecoration

The ground floor of the Centre was redecorated internally giving a fresher, more modern appearance and hopefully enhancing its attraction to potential customers.

Parts of the exterior are scheduled for decoration and repair in 2023.

Masonry, roof and guttering

Repointing was carried out to much of the south elevation of the Centre several years ago.

Gutters and downcomers were cleared and several blockages removed across the Centre and the Church and roof repairs were carried out on both buildings.

Drains

Problems with the drains were identified as tree roots getting into the pipes and these were cleared by a specialist firm.

Grounds

Completed Works

Calvary Cross reinstatement

Another major project in the year was to undertake a number of works to reinstate the Cross, following its theft and damage.

The Cross itself had a visit to specialist repairers in Edinburgh. Meanwhile a new stone plinth was created, new uplighters installed to make a feature of the Cross at night and CCTV installed to increase security.

The work was crowdfunded through Spacehive and we are grateful to North of Tyne Authority, the Community Foundation and very generous individual donors who enabled this work to take place. We look forward to welcoming them and the people of Gosforth to a rededication service on 26th March.

Draining the Green

Fundraising for the Calvary Cross also included an element to enhance the surrounding green areas of the Church.

The main green has had a problem with drainage for a number of years, which reduces our capacity to host external events; services, Farmers' Market etc. It is anticipated that this will be drained at the end of March 2023. The work will include creation of an accessible ramp onto the green area.

Works in preparation

We anticipate another busy year ahead with a number of potential works in the pipeline.

Church

Organ repair

Our organ is a very fine instrument, however a recent inspection by Harrison and Harrison, the manufacturer, has identified some £107,000 of remedial works. Whilst these can be carried out piecemeal it is felt to be more effective to carry out the repairs in one go, utilising a generous legacy received in 2022.

Woodwork and carvings

Further specialist repair by Ray Harrison is planned to replace missing carving pieces, using existing 'bits' and creating new pieces where required.

Grounds

A review of external noticeboards will be undertaken to update and ensure they are fit for purpose. Further work in 'Greening the green' is being investigated, including suitable tree planting and environmental improvements following drainage.

Centre

There are issues with the Centre, particularly in relation to accessibility of smaller rooms for meetings and social events. Toilet and kitchen facilities are also in need of updating. A project team is being established to consult on potential changes and then to organise fund raising to see the work through to completion.

Church Gardening Group

To the north and east of our church there are wide grass verges and mature trees. To the south is the Garden of Remembrance and to the west is the church green. The green is used for church activities and the Garden of Remembrance is consecrated for the burial of ashes. Mature trees surround the church and the green and add to the attractiveness of the grounds.

Many people visit the Garden of Remembrance to remember the departed, to pray or to find a quiet place in a busy City. The newly restored Calvary and plinth has great impact. The Calvary is an important reminder that Christ suffers with us.

The beech hedge along West Avenue was layered at the beginning of last year by Northumberland Wildlife Trust. The church greatly appreciates the Trusts expertise and energy. This spring should see the hedge thicken and in time will provide a healthy habitat for wildlife.

The church is grateful to a small team of dedicated gardeners, grass cutters and those who maintain the edges of our paths. Members of the Gardening Group forgo their free time to plant, weed, walk miles behind lawnmowers or remove weeds from the joints in our pavements to ensure our church and its grounds look attractive. Their skill and energy are much appreciated by members of the church and the wider Gosforth community.

Choir

It has been quite a year for music here at All Saints. It's fair to say that the choir have been pushed - in some cases into hitherto unfamiliar territory (like Cole Porter), but it is clear from the positive comments from the congregation and others that our efforts are paying off. The gradual building up of the choir in terms of both the numbers of singers and our repertoire continues and I'm happy to say that the frequency of situations where I have had to compromise or rethink seems to be decreasing steadily as the choir's confidence builds.

One notable improvement for me is our psalmody. I can honestly say that the All Saints choir now sing psalms better than certain cathedral choirs I have worked with (that shall remain...Edinburgh) having now mastered the correct singing of trochaic endings. Our regular Evensong services at the end of each month operate on an "open door" policy and we regularly welcome guest singers from the Cathedral, St George's Jesmond, St Peter's Monkseaton and St Nicholas' Gosforth to boost our numbers for a BIG sing. We are now very familiar with the William Smith responses and are currently in process of learning the wonderfully rhythmic setting by John Reading - these are classics from the Tudor period and neither are your usual parish church fayre.

The last twelve months have not been without their share of trauma; we were shocked and saddened by the sudden death of Dorothy Henderson last year, and more recently by the loss of Ann Shaw; they are both very much missed. We have however been lucky enough to enlist some new choir members recently and I am always on the lookout for potential recruits. No one is safe!

The BIG musical event last year was of course Jesus Christ Superstar. We finally got to perform the show, having postponed it for 2 years due to the pandemic. It took a lot of work from a lot of people and it was very gratifying to see musicians and technical experts from the bands I have worked with and singers from my time at the cathedral working alongside All Saints choir and congregation members to realise a very ambitious project. It truly was a community effort and the hard work that we all put in was very much worth it. I still get comments about it and I look back fondly on the whole endeavour. Perhaps we'll do it all again next year?

I have always agreed wholeheartedly with the axiom "variety is the spice of life" and I am gratified by the church's and the choir's willingness to embrace some of my more left-field musical ideas, such as using pre-recorded trumpet and military drum track to accompany the choir in the Remembrance Day anthem "For The Fallen", creating a horn duet in a traditional Czech carol or giving the rather conservative Lent Prose a new lease of life by applying some new and quite adventurous harmonies. Thanks for the opportunity to be adventurous.

For the future, I hope to continue to build on our relationships with other local churches and with the Cathedral. I intend to make use of available local organists to accompany the choir while I focus on conducting and thus allow us to tackle some of the larger works in our *very* extensive library. I will continue to seek out new choir members, especially youngsters. I look forward to the refit of our wonderful organ - I have my fingers crossed that Harrisons (the organ builders) are able to add a particular facility - more on that later.

I want to take this opportunity to thank the choir for their enthusiasm, dedication and hard work. They are a wonderful and friendly bunch of people, we have a great time rehearsing and performing and the sound is more cohesive now than ever. I am proud of what we have achieved so far and look forward to continuing to build upon it.

Little Saints Parent/Carer and Toddler Group

The group has enjoyed an uninterrupted year of play and fun, meeting from 1.00 to 2.30pm every Tuesday afternoon during school term times. Approximately twenty families have enjoyed Little Saints activities during the year, though not altogether every week. The group is 'drop-in when you can', so no-one feels obliged to come along every week (it is, anyway, very difficult to make commitments on behalf of a very small child!).

What do we do in an hour and a half? Children make their own choices of play from the resources set out in the hall. These range from physical play on small slides to domestic play in the 'shop' and 'kitchen' and small world play with cars and space toys. Construction with lego and magnetic tubes is always fun whilst the book box offers a (potentially) calmer moment. Play dough is always on offer as is a weekly craft which can usually be taken home. Babies have a range of safe toys to explore but are often seen alongside the older children, watching and learning what they can do next! After a healthy snack, each session ends with song-time before families say "good-bye" in time to collect any older siblings from school.

Although parents/carers remain responsible for their children throughout the session, there is time for adult interaction whilst supervising and joining in with the children. Play dough offers creative opportunities for children but often acts as a therapy resource for the adults!

The group could not run without the support of our clergy - thank you to Andrew, Ruth and Miriam. Sincere thanks are also due to Helen Poole, who organises the snacks most weeks and to Tricia Maylia who puts out the resources each week, enabling the group to almost run itself.

If you know of families with pre-school children who would enjoy an afternoon of free-play with snack and song for the cost of £3.00 per session, do signpost them to Little Saints from 1.30 - 2.30pm each Tuesday afternoon. They will be most welcome. And if you would like to help with the group in any way, Lesley Atkinson would love to hear from you.

Young Saints

Each Sunday morning, with the exception of the holiday month of August, the Young Saints leaders prepare teaching and resources for our children and young people. The teaching generally relates to the main theme for that week, as experienced by the adults in church but presented in an interactive way to engage the children. We have thoroughly enjoyed working with the young children, and their families, who have come along to share Sunday morning worship with us.

However, numbers have continued to decline. Last year, I reported that, in common with many other parishes throughout the Diocese, fewer children were attending Sunday worship groups; weekly numbers have reduced further so that on many Sundays, we have had no Young Saints at all.

'Young Saints' is just one way of including children and young people in the life of All Saints'. Faith@4 sessions led by Miriam Jones, Assistant Curate, have become a regular feature on the last Sunday of each month, offering a short, relaxed style of family worship at a later time on Sunday afternoons and there are plans for young people to be more actively included in mainstream services throughout the year. We hope that families will enjoy and respond to different styles of worship and increased opportunities for involvement provided by our future worship activities.

Thanks to Ann Cross, Felicity Shoesmith and Helen Langley for organising and leading the weekly sessions and to all the parents who have brought along their children and helped with the Young Saints' groups.

Youth Committee

The Reverend Beverley Davies chaired the Committee until the end of September. After much work on the job description, an advert for a Children's, Young People and Family Worker went to press in February but no one applied for the post. The Committee kept up to date with Young Saints and Little Saints: Numbers for both groups continued to be low but those attending appear to value what was offered.

The group often discussed weekend demands on young families. It was felt that families involved with weekend sports would not be able to join morning services. It was thought that new services such as Faith @4pm should be held in the afternoon but also we should encourage young families to attend on mornings when they can. It was noted that Felicity Shoesmith's talk to the 9.30am congregation had been well received. It was agreed that everyone needs to be involved in making families feel welcomed in church.

North East Youth for Christ (YFC) continued to be involved with the Tuesday Evolution youth club and it was decided to pay Youth for Christ for the help of a Youth Worker Jaddai Kambeya for one Tuesday a week and one Sunday a month in term time from December until July 2023.

In December a regular meeting was planned between the Youth Committee, the Sunday school teachers and the Funding and Renewal Group in January to be called the Youth Forum.

The Youth Forum – supporting young people at All Saints

Over recent years the number of young people involved in activities at All Saints has reduced. This situation is not unique to All Saints and in part is a reflection of a wider range of activities that take place on a Sunday. At the end of September I gave the address in Church, encouraging members of the congregation to reflect on their own childhood experience of being part of a Church community. As part of

this address I raised the need for more help with Sunday School and help with rethinking ways of involving our young members.

Since then we have seen a number of new initiatives, including a contemporary take on the nativity ('Nativity NOW!') led by Ros Place and replacing the Christmas Eve Crib Service, the arrival of Jaddai as our new Youth and Family worker, the introduction of a challenge cup for members of the uniformed groups linked to All Saints and the development in 2022 "Youth Forum" which met in January 2023. Membership of the Youth Forum is open to anyone that wants to help develop and shape the involvement of young people, it is currently led by Miriam and our work is directed by a draft young people's strategy. This strategy looks at making contact, building relationships, sharing the good news and nurturing faith. To support our thinking we have looked to develop plans for 4 different age groups: pre-school, first school, middle school and high school.

The Youth Forum will oversee the development of a monthly "All Together" Sunday worship at our 9:30 service. We have agreed that this will take place on the second Sunday of each month. We would welcome more young people to help during this service, as well as anyone that would like to be involved in the preparation and running of these services.

Another initiative for which planning began in 2022 is the Faith@4 service, which takes place in the All Saints Centre on the last Sunday of each month at 4pm. Intended to be accessible to all ages, it is a relaxed time including singing, crafts and snacks as well as a Bible story or theme for reflection. Faith@4 picks up on pre-pandemic plans for a different style of service, and is currently planned and led by Miriam or Andrew with the help of a team of volunteers.

Planned Giving

There were 134 members on our Planned Giving scheme at 31 December 2022 compared with 137 at the end of 2021, the reduction mostly caused by deaths or people moving away but offset by some new members. Planned Giving decreased by £6,163 compared with the previous year. As ever, we are extremely grateful to everyone who continues to support us so regularly.

Deanery Synod

The Central Deanery meeting on 12th May at the Church of the Ascension Kenton discussed a proposal made by General Synod in February 2020 for churches to achieve net zero carbon emissions by 2030, on the expenditure this would involve and also on whether it was realistic to promise to achieve rather than aim to do so. All churches were identified as being *red*, *amber*, *green* and *gold*. We agreed on an amendment to the wording.

We discussed **addressing local needs** – food poverty, homelessness, Health & Safety and work in schools; also ways of sharing resources across the deanery with some kind of directory of useful materials, music, details of individuals with particular experience in some areas.

At Holy Trinity Jesmond on 7th July we wandered around their centenary exhibition before broaching discussions in groups on the challenges each parish faced, the gifts we were proud of or might be able to share, the opportunities for mission and what we needed to make use of those opportunities. Common points were dwindling numbers of volunteers, the fact that some gifts were not possible to scale up, and reluctance for volunteers to sign up for more than they had envisaged doing locally.

At **St Thomas the Martyr Church**, **Haymarket** on **20th October 2022** we toured the refurbished church building before - divided between small tables - poring over sheets of the Diocesan Self Review. We were asked to check estimates of our current attendance figures given the 3+ years since the previous Review. Anomalies were spotted and corrected. Statistics were given on the spreadsheet of churches' average income, their parish share plus a 2.7% increase in 2018. These revelatory factsheets were collected in most carefully, unfortunately. I have no recollection of discussing Eco Planning as on the agenda.

At an **Open Deanery Synod meeting** at **St Thomas the Martyr Church, Haymarket** on **8th March 2023** we discussed the **Deanery 3-year Development Plan** (due in June), encouraged to develop a 'wider perspective than just parish' in the light of clergy numbers being cut. We were asked to pass on names of laypeople able and willing to share skills and experience helping across the deanery in work with youth, music, finance, fabric, safeguarding, social mission, Readers, churchwardens (4 of the churches there had currently only one acting churchwarden) and so on. My table suggested inviting all churches to send in details to the Deanery e-bulletin of their events (for instance for the King's Coronation on Sat May 6th) for general circulation.

The year 2022 invitations:

- We were all invited to a **Celtic Forest Church service** at **St Nicholas Parish Church** on **Sat 10th September 2022** 2-3pm, organised by Ella Vickers, the Central Deanery Eco Co-ordinator.
- Revd Trevor Marshall (National Giving Ministry Advisor) invited us to a Newcastle Diocese workshop at St Mary the Virgin Church Hall, Monkseaton on Mon 12th Sept 6pm – 8pm in advance of Newcastle Diocese Generosity Week 25th Sept – 2nd Oct 2022.
- Suggestions at the Central Deanery meeting in January 2022 of opportunities for praying together led to an invitation to a **Prayer Walk** from the **Cathedral** to the **Laing Art Gallery** and then on to **St Mary's Chapel** on **Sat 17th September 2022**.
- Open Deanery Synod meeting on Thursday 9th March 2023, 19:30 at St Thomas Church in Haymarket

July brought a visit from the new Diocesan President, Margy Tasker-Brown, but also the death of dear Alfhild Wellborne, who had been Branch Leader for many years before me.

We don't have a meeting in August, but many of us went to the cathedral on Mary Sumner Day (9th August) to see, and hear, all about the amazing work that's been done there. September to December included an update re. Tyneside Welcomes by Andrew Cole, Ethel Randall's Fun Quiz at our Harvest Meeting, an enjoyable silk painting session led by Karoline Wellborne, our participation in the 16 Days of Activism against Gender-based Violence and our usual Christmas Party. The last meeting (March) was entitled 'Encouragement' and Miriam Jones gave us a deeply sincere talk about her 'Journey in Faith' which was much appreciated. Also, in March, we were devastated by the sudden death of Ann Shaw – an active and committed member of our branch.

We have made up the usual Christmas Bags for the homeless, donated money towards bedding for mothers leaving the refuges and £100 for tracksuit bottoms and trainers for the People's Kitchen. We've also sent £48.00 to Mary Sumner House which covers a 'Gift for Perseverance' which allows Ugandan mothers and their children to live in a safe place away from abuse and violence.

Finally, we would love to welcome a few more members in the near future and anyone is welcome to come along to any of our meetings on the second Monday of each month, 2.00pm in the Church Centre. No need to be a member.

Tyneside Welcomes

The charity Tyneside Welcomes was brought its first family from Syria in July 2021. That same month two founder members spoke about their work in church one Sunday morning. There was a strong sense that we should follow their example, and by October we had a Gosforth branch of Tyneside Welcomes founded and supported by All Saints Church. The aim of our branch is to settle another refugee family in the North East through the Government Community Sponsorship Scheme. In last year's report I said that we hoped to be supporting a family by the time this one was due. Well, we're not quite there yet, so I had better explain what we *have* been doing.

The issue which determines how fast almost all Community Sponsorship groups welcome a family is finding accommodation. We had expected that a local Housing Association would be able to help, but when this proved unfounded, we had to concentrate on finding something suitable in the private sector. We distributed thousands of leaflets (including with the All Saints' Christmas Card drop) looking for a generous landlord willing and able to rent their property at Housing benefit rates. (This is increasingly difficult as the Housing element of Income Support has been frozen for several years whilst private rents continue to rise.) We were therefore delighted when just before Christmas we were contacted by a generous couple willing to rent us their property within our budget.

After a variety of checks (Police, Council) our team and the flat were matched up with potentially suitable families and we have been allocated one! They fled to Turkey from the Civil War in Syria and have it seems also been affected by the recent earthquake. We hope that they will be arriving within the next few months.

Recent news has been full of the plight of refugees arriving legally from Afghanistan but living in hotels where they have no resources to get on with their lives. Our team has been working hard behind the scenes to ensure this will not be the case when we are able to welcome a family. We have been preparing plans for finding the family GP's and dentists (we can even offer an Arabic speaking one!); finding suitable local schools and helping he children adjust to them; guiding them through the benefits system, maximising opportunities to learn English, as well as showing them around our unique city and beautiful surrounding countryside.

The Gosforth Branch has also been supporting the wider work of Tyneside Welcomes. In the past year a further two families, totalling 12 individuals have arrived in our area with support from branches in Gateshead and North Shields. The ongoing fund raising efforts of the Gosforth Branch have been important in making this possible; we all know that £9000 does not go as far as it did in 2021 when that was our target for supporting a family. Tyneside Welcomes remains very grateful to All Saints Church for assistance with fundraising through sharing the proceeds from the hugely enjoyable Jigsaw choir concert in August, hosting our preserves and decorations stall at the Christmas Fair, and by making us Mission of the Month in February.

Although we describe our local groups as branches, it has become apparent that Tyneside Welcomes needs to be a network for mutual support. We would not be close to welcoming a family in Newcastle without the advice and support of those who have done it before. Now we have been able to return some of that goodwill through our members giving hands on help in North Shields and Gateshead when those branches were finding things tough. All of this has helped build up a network of relationships, particularly with members of St Charles Roman Catholic Church and the Quaker Meeting, but also with people of goodwill across Tyneside.
