Transformation

In the miracle of changing of water into wine at the wedding in Cana we see a response to a social crisis.

Whether it was because of the limited budget of the host or the greed of the guests, the wine had all been drunk. In those days not having enough wine would be much more than an inconvenience or an embarrassment, it would spell social disaster. If the family were unable to meet the obligations of hospitality, this would be permanently shaming and would lower their standing in the community forever. It is against the background of this honour and shame culture that Mary requests the help of Jesus on the family's behalf.

On the surface, it is a story about Jesus' compassion for a family in trouble and his willingness to help them. But behind this human drama the writer of John's Gospel sees great significance. He begins his story, 'On the third day', and any mention of 'the third day' reminds the reader of the story of the resurrection. The water that turns into wine is drawn from the jars intended for the Jewish rites of purification, and so, from the rites of cleansing, comes the flowing new wine of the kingdom and of a new age. This is a miracle that speaks of joy and celebration, and hints at a banquet to come at the end of time. The wine that flows offers not cleansing according to the law, but the joyful completion of creation through God's generosity.

Paul Butler, Bishop of Durham This will probably be the last film from the fiercely humanistic veteran director Ken Loach. Like "I Daniel Blake" and "Sorry We Missed You" it is set in our very own North East England. But this film has more than merely geographical claims on our attention at All Saints. It deals with a Syrian refugee family who could easily become scapegoats in a community where people feel left behind. All Saints is of course helping to resettle a Syrian family through the Gosforth

branch of Tyneside Welcomes. Not only that, but the screenplay was developed in collaboration with community organisers from Tyne & Wear Citizens, to which All Saints is also affiliated. Because of that link we are very excited to welcome Claire Rodgerson, who has a role in the film, to join our discussion. The language is tough and uncomfortable at times, but there is hope as well as challenge and (especially for us!) a beautiful scene in Durham Cathedral with evensong in the background. 

ALL SAINTS CHURCH GOSFORTH: AMNESTY GROUP LETTER JANUARY 2024

Rita Karasartova is a human rights campaigner and an expert in civil governance in Kyrgyzstan, who has for over a decade provided independent legal advice and helped people wronged by a corrupt and unreliable legal system. In October 2022 she and 26 other people were arrested during a peaceful demonstration to oppose a new border agreement that would give control of a freshwater reservoir to Uzbekistan, because they feared that Uzbekistan would restrict or prohibit access to this water, which is scarce in the region. They were charged with organising "mass disorder". Rita was charged with attempting to "violently overthrow the government", which carries a prison sentence of up to 15 years. She was detained in a cramped cell for months without access to healthcare or contact with her family and is now under house arrest with a strict curfew.

Dear General Prosecutor

Rita Karasartova

I am writing to express my concern at the imprisonment and current house arrest of Rita Karasartova.

Rita was arrested in October 2022 with 26 other people after a peaceful protest against a new border agreement that gave control of a freshwater reservoir to Uzbekistan. The protesters feared that Uzbekistan would restrict or prohibit access to this water which is scarce in the region. They were charged with organising "mass disorder" and Rita was additionally charged with attempting to "violently overthrow the government".

She was kept in a cramped cell for months without access to healthcare or contact with her family and is now under house arrest with a strict curfew.

I urge you to order Rita's immediate and unconditional release from house arrest and to drop all the charges against her, so that she can continue her legitimate work as a campaigner for human rights without fear of retaliation.




